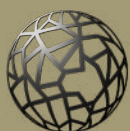

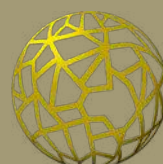

In Zambia and Malawi men, women and children continue to find hope in sustainable community projects which make lasting changes to their lives and well-being.

In **Zambia** Some of the highlights of this food and income security program over the 12 month period have been -

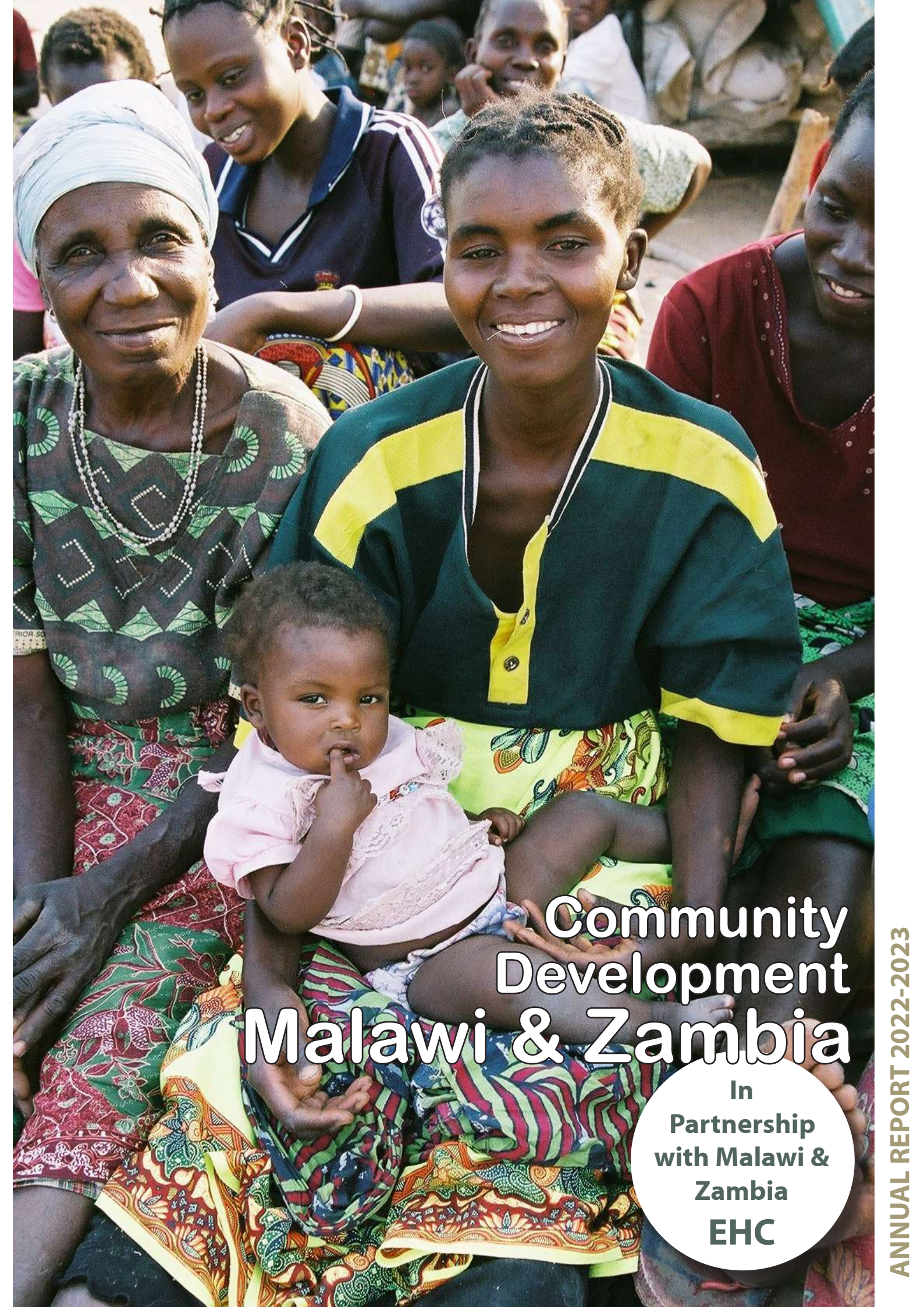
- \* 4,018 men, women and children were directly impacted, experiencing beneficial life changes (806 farmers and their 3,212 family members)
- \* 131 of these families now have two or more forms of livestock e.g. goats and chickens as a source of food and income. The pass-on program is continuing.
- \* 41% of the maize grown was able to be stored for the lean months (after consumption and the sale of maize as an income source)
- \* 806 men and women utilised modern farming/conservation farming technologies in their fields and adopted climate change and environmental methods as a result of training



760 girls were trained in menstrual hygiene and given sanitary products

- \* 1,200 people attended training on sanitation and are now accessing clean water through the rehabilitation/building of wells and toilets
- \* 55 orphans under 5 are receiving daily food and basic education through the building of a Feeding Centre. A new deep water well is providing fresh water to 800 people living around the Feeding Centre.
- \* 85% of the women attended training and activities related to gender and women's rights, with 1500 women attending sessions on child protection
- \* 2,500 people sensitized regarding HIV/Aids and malaria prevention with 988 people being tested for Aids (a 15% increase)
- \* 100 loans were given enabling 125 men and women in income-generation groups to start their own businesses and increase their average income by 2%

# Evaluation Malawi

(evaluated by the 450 women involved  
in the project after one year)

The women of Mkakatavu village said that life before being involved in the project was not good; there was no group, hence women had no access to training in nutrition and every woman was working on her own at her home. There was lack of knowledge in the community on how to do things and there was not any mode of sharing or receiving information within the area. Cases of malnutrition were very high and people had no capacity to do different activities which could have helped them to earn an income. There was a high rate of school dropouts since children went to school with an empty stomach. Women used to do different piece works in other people's fields to earn money to buy food.



The women said things have really changed now in the village after one year. Women are organised and they are in groups whereby they are able to meet and discuss different topics on nutrition, modern farming technologies, sharing ideas and making follow-ups in the community if there is any case of malnutrition. Every month they meet and give reports of their group in different activities. Cases of malnutrition have dropped since women are able to follow balanced meal recipes, learn from food demonstrations and follow good hygiene practices. After being in the project women have started different businesses and have enrolled in income generating groups where they earn an income to buy different food items in their homes. School dropouts have reduced since children are having food before going to school and their performance has improved. Women are income secure after being trained in a variety of subjects and they are now self-reliant.

# 2022 -2023 Malawi Food and Income Security Yearly Report - Targeting 450 Women

In the first year of this 3 year project 48% of households have increased income, 64% of the population have access to clean and protected drinking water sources and despite drought 194 households (43%) are now eating three meals /day, resulting in improved health & well-being.

**8** 8 income generating activities were established (sewing machine, bakery, bee keeping, soap making, piggery, mushroom enterprise and dried cassava processing) during the season despite the natural disaster (drought) enabling disadvantaged women to provide for their families.

**48%** 48% of women households have increased income at the household level to MK75, 000 which assisted members in the 12 Village Savings & Loans groups and 14 business groups to pay off their loans and start activities in their groups.

**108** 108 training sessions were conducted in good agricultural practices, 20 women-headed households were given starter up inputs to mount demonstration training plots.

**194** 194 households (43%) have been food secure in 3 staple food crops, are eating 3 meals and 6 food groups per day resulting to 76% drop in malnutrition cases in the disaster season.

**381** 381 women households have been trained in climate change resilience technologies leading to planting of 3,012 trees, 224 people utilising fire briquettes and 375 households utilising mud stoves when cooking to avoid cutting down of trees for firewood.

**167** 167 women-headed households adopted conservation agriculture technologies very well but due to prolonged drought from February to mid-March 2023 maize yields have been very low (from 8000kg expected to 700kg per hectare). 50 cassava bundles were distributed to 20 households for multiplication through the pass on program.

**450** Every Home for Christ in Malawi supported 450 women with 450 cassava bundles, 450 sachets of vegetable seeds and 45 watering cans for winter cropping as drought mitigation measures.

**2,438** 2,438 people have increased access to basic sanitation and general health benefits with 450 women constructing mud toilets at their homes, the most vulnerable women being given Eco San toilets.

**22** 22 shallow wells have been rehabilitated during the season and as a result diarrhoea cases have been reduced by 85%, improving health.

# Bangladesh

While in Bangladesh a strong recovery from the coronavirus disease (COVID-19) pandemic continued in 2022, rising commodity prices and a surge in imports in the second half of the year has accelerated inflation, making it more difficult for the most vulnerable people to meet their basic needs.

Many of the men and women being helped by the EHGC community development program have reported how their involvement in the projects has brought financial stability to their family and made them very happy.

Rebu Akter (pictured on the opposite page, is extremely happy as she has been able to help her husband who receives a very low salary as they have a family of 6 to care for. She was selected to benefit from the sewing program and because of her financial situation, was given a free sewing machine and is now earning an income. She is one of 31 women who received sewing machines and training over the 12 month period, enabling an increase in financial stability.

Mr Suman Ghosh (pictured on the left) is one of the 30 unskilled men who received a rickshaw van from the program, making it possible for him to increase his income. Prior to the project he would be forced to rent a van at an exorbitant rate, leaving him with no profit at the end of a hard day's work. These 30 rickshaw pullers are now able to earn more income, pay back 50% of the cost of the van to Every Home Global Concern and then all the income they earn is profit. An evaluation highlighted the fact that many of these families have been able to move out of the slums as a result.

The third component of the community development program is primary school education for children living in poverty. Commenced in 1984 these 4 schools educate almost 1,000 children each year, providing school uniforms, bags, educational books and equipment, a hot meal each day, clean water, free education and new clothes at Christmas. Pictured opposite are some of the children delightedly carrying their new schoolbags. Many thanks to all the child sponsors who care for these children, giving them an Australian, New Zealand or British 'friend' which makes them very happy.

India is now the world's most populous nation and is currently home to nearly 1.4 billion people, including 460 million children. UNICEF reported that the Coronavirus pandemic led to one of the world's longest school closures, (more than 12 months) which has now created a significant learning loss, especially among disadvantaged groups. Children from scheduled castes and tribes and minority communities had the lowest performance levels. However, the children from the Love Annupampattu school have continued to pass their exams and graduate to the next level, thanks to the dedication of the teachers and staff who went "the second-mile" to make sure these children from a low-caste village received their education. The children are now back at the school however numbers have decreased from 180 to 168 children, almost 50% being girls.

Over the 12 month period the sewing classes have continued, both in Annupampattu and in Koraikkapum (in a hall built by EHC after the Tsunami) with 27 women graduating in tailoring and 8 in embroidery. These classes have given unskilled women opportunity to help with the family income, especially needed during the pandemic and economic "shocks" felt in the community.

During December/January of 2022/23 Setatow Befekadu visited 6 of the 9 prisons targeted by Eloi Prison Ministry.

In four of the prisons eight new computers were provided, along with 8 more computers given by the prisons themselves - according to Eloi Prison Ministry's partnership agreement with each of the four prisons. There are now 86 inmates being trained in computer skills in 5 of the prisons, providing the prisoners with skills they can use when they leave the prison - to earn an income instead of resorting once again to crime.

30 male and female inmates at Debrebrhane Prison who are being trained in tailoring skills were presented with a new sewing machine and fabric along with another machine from the prison. Most prisoners are unskilled and this program is giving them beneficial life skills.

An exciting new project has just commenced in Butajira Prison and based on a project proposal and price study provided by Eloi Prison Ministry, an agreement was established with the prison regarding the construction of a cooking kitchen where inmates can be trained in cooking skills. Eloi Prison Ministry agreed to cover 50% of the project cost with Butajira Prison covering the remaining 50%.



Water pumps are provided to inmates for irrigation purposes, allowing them to efficiently manage their agricultural activities and generate valuable resources.



We extended our support by distributing clothes to children in prison and establishing a childcare centre within one of the prison schools.

## Financial position in plain language:

**2022-2023 has been another year of blessing thanks to the generosity of many men and women who made donations to the ministry of Every Home Global Concern/Every Home for Christ.** Overall donation income included a large bequest of almost \$280,000 and as always, bequests are a welcome asset to the ministry. 95.7% of income raised was sent overseas, primarily for use by our EHC/EHGC partners for literature distribution and to assist people living in poverty as outlined in this Annual Report. According to our auditors EHGC is in a financially sound position and is able to pay all its bills, pay the staff and send the budgets overseas. Without the donors this could not happen. Thank you for the part you have played. You are greatly appreciated.

# Humanitarian Assistance

## Turkey/Syria

On 6 February 2023, a magnitude 7.8 earthquake struck southern and central Turkey and northern and western Syria - the deadliest natural disaster in its modern history. There was widespread damage and tens of thousands of fatalities with an estimated 14 million people affected. The United Nations estimated that about 1.5 million people were left homeless. Damaged roads, winter storms and disruption to communications hampered the Disaster and Emergency Management rescue and relief effort which included a 60,000-strong search-and-rescue force, 5,000 health workers and 30,000 volunteers. Following Turkey's call for international help, more than 141,000 people from 94 countries joined the rescue effort with Every Home Global Concern playing a small part working with partners in the country, supporting their efforts to provide food, water, medicine, blankets, clothing, etc. to the victims of this disaster.

In **TURKEY** 57,704 men, women and children were provided with gifts/humanitarian aid.

In **SYRIA** from February 16th through June 30th, 2023 (Timeframe of relief work being done in Syria): 26,460 individuals were provided with gifts/aid.

## Ukraine

The initial overwhelming response to the crisis in Ukraine was reported on in the 2021-2022 Annual Report and this humanitarian assistance continued into this financial year.

However, Every Home has now given over the long-term work to another organisation on the ground who is helping with the continuing rebuilding of lives in Ukraine.
